Over 175 golfers participated in the tournament and competed for various prizes. While Zlatko has been holding the golf tournament for a number of years, this year was very special for the CSF. This year it was held to benefit the Croatian Scholarship Fund!

Zlatko was born in Medugorje, Hercegovina and came to the United States as a young man. He arrived in the Sacramento area in 1969 where he settled and became a respected member of the Croatian community. Zlatko was always willing to participate and support the Croatian cause, especially during the Croatian homeland war. He started a successful auto body repair business from which he recently retired. He is still involved and helps his brother Jozo and son Marko run the business. We are glad that now Zlatko has more time for his beloved golf course.

Big Joe attended the CSF Dinner Dance at the Croatian American Cultural Center (CACC) last April. He learned more about the CSF program and its various fundraising events and wanted to participate. He was particularly impressed with the orga-

nization's commitment to helping young students in Croatia and Bosnia and Hercegovina to attend a university in Croatia. He knew that with a college education, they would be the future leaders of Croatia.

Zlatko decided that his annual golf tournament was the perfect way to further CSF's cause. With the help of his son, Marko, he raised over \$16,000 from the tournament. After covering expenses, he donated some of the funds to St. Mary's Catholic Church in San Jose and a most generous \$10,000 to the Croatian Scholarship Fund.

Nothing is more important to the future of our homeland than the education of the next generation of its leaders. Donors such as Zlatko Vasilj are making an immeasurable difference in that future.

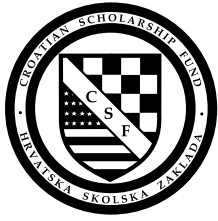

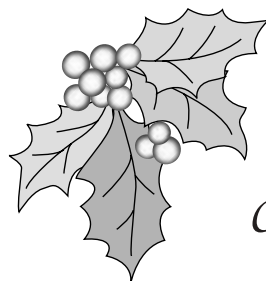

Scholarship Recipients Share Their Stories

My name is Dijana Zilic. I was born in Konjic, a small multi-national city in Bosnia and Hercegovina in 1975. I lived there happily for seventeen years with my mother, father and brother. I had always been a good pupil and after elementary school I studied math, physics and computer science at my home town high school.

But my happy childhood and education were cut short in 1992 when the war started in Bosnia and Hercegovina. During the summer my father died suddenly from a heart attack. My brother went to Zagreb to continue his education and my mother and I stayed in Konjic which was exposed to bombs every day from the Serbian army. Life in the town was at a standstill; people were dying every day from the shelling; factories and schools closed. Things became even worse the next year when the war between Croats and Muslims started. After several months in military encirclement, my mother and I had to leave our house in Konjic and go to Zagreb as refugees. After 17 months I returned to school and attended high school in Zagreb. The only income my family had was a survivors' pension from my father (about \$100 per month), which was miserably below the normal standard of living in Croatia. My brother had to quit his schooling in order to work and

I was born 22 years ago in the small Slavonian town of Nova Gradiska. My father was a laborer and my mother a housewife. From an early age, I learned what hard work and commitment means to me. I've realized that everything was achievable, every goal I set could be manageable if I only worked hard. My motto was, "I can do it!"

During my high school days I discovered my interest in politics – in both forms: theory and practice. I started to read a lot of books concerning the political aspect of our everyday lives. I was always willing to know more, and soon this became my passion. It seemed logical for me to go to university, to the School of Political Science in Zagreb. Of course, money was a problem in realizing this dream.

Then, completely unexpectedly, I found out about the Croatian Scholarship Fund's contest published in one of Croatia's daily newspapers. Two months later I received

my mother found employment as a cleaning lady in the rich houses of Zagreb. Through my high school, I learned about the Croatian Scholarship Fund. I applied and received a scholarship for my future education and in 1995, I finished high school as one of the five best pupils of the year.

I then went on to study physics at the School of Science at the University of Zagreb. My mother and I, my brother, his wife and their baby now shared a rented apartment. With regular attendance and a high grade average I received a fellowship of \$100 a month which was more than welcome. In 2002 I graduated in experimental solid state physics and I was employed at Rudjer Boskovic Institute in Zagreb.

Today I am a research assistant in the laboratory for magnetic resonance, where I am working on my Ph.D. in molecular magnetism. I also work as a teaching assistant at the University of Veterinary Medicine, where I teach medicine physics. Last year, I bought my own apartment (of course with a 30-year mortgage) so finally I am no longer a sub-tenant. My life today is much better and I am very grateful for all the help I received, and especially for my CSF scholarship.

CSF's scholarship. From that time, I've become the happiest man on earth! These were great things for me!

CSF scholarship has meant a lot to me during my study. My family was having financial troubles in the early days of my university life, and help from all those lovely people involved in CSF became priceless for us. My brother was a student also, and with the average income our father was receiving, it was very hard to finance two students in different towns and to live a normal life.

The CSF scholarship was a salvation for us. First of all, without it I wouldn't be able to go to university. It's not all about money in life, but my case shows that money can sometimes be crucial. And because of this financial aspect of your unselfish help, I want to THANK YOU!

From the beginning of my study I've worked hard to learn and to gain as much knowledge as possible. I realized that only with knowledge could I make my way up.

And now after four years of studying I can proudly say that I'm one of the best students of my generation. This hard and committed work was recognized by others – colleagues and professors.

I discovered that CSF was founded to financially help young women and men in Croatia and Bosnia and Hercegovina to build their dreams. I realized that the greatness and significance of the Croatian Scholarship Fund and all people involved in it is not only in financial help, although the money is important. What makes me proud of CSF is actually a CARING. It's an exceptional feeling to know that there are people on another part of the globe who care about me. There are Croatians in a foreign country who have succeeded there, who have built their homes and raised families far away from Croatia, who live and die there. Bill Belichick

Superbowl's Croatian Coach

Having guided the New England Patriots to three NFL Superbowl championships in four years, Bill Belichick is regarded as the leagues' premier coach of the past decade. Though millions of football fans know his record, few are aware of his family background.

His grandparents were immigrants from Croatia who settled in Youngtown, Ohio, where they struggled to survive the great depression. A son, Steve, was born there. Their true family name was Bilicic but when his first grade teacher had difficulty spelling and pronouncing his name, she changed it to Belichick.

Steve played football in high school. When he received a scholarship to Western Reserve, it changed his life. He chose coaching football to be his life's vocation. His dedication to that goal led him to serve on the football staffs of Vanderbilt University, University of North Carolina and The U. S. Naval Academy. In

all, he coached for 60 years, 33 of which were at the Naval Academy.

In 1952 a son, Bill, was born. At four or five years of age, he started watching his father coach and as he grew older, his passion for football increased. He was at his father's side for hundreds of hours observing the breakdown of game film. His cherished reward was to accompany his father to scout opponents.

At Annapolis High School, Bill was the starting fullback. It was unlikely he would be granted a scholarship at institutions that played at the highest level. The father and son agreed that he should attend a good, small private college. Upon graduation, Bill enrolled at Andover. There he met Steve Sorota, a son of Polish immigrants who was the football coach; a title he held for 41 years. Mr. Sorota's coaching philosophy, methods, and character were closely observed by the aspiring coach.

As graduation loomed, Bill Belichick was concerned that he had little prospect of employment as a football coach. At the suggestion of a friend, he applied for a job with the Baltimore Colts as virtually an unpaid assistant. This was the opening chapter to his amazing career.

The life's story of Bill Belichick is similar to many others whose Croatian grandparents, with little or no finances or education, immigrated to the U.S. to provide a better life for their children. Overcoming many obstacles and hardships, they fulfilled their hopes. The first generation of children born in the U.S. inherited their parents' determination to become all they could be. Today's third generation of children are successful in business, professions, technology, education, and virtually all other fields of endeavor requiring intellect, perseverance and aspiration.

Vice President Honored at Sugar Bowl Reunion



CSF Vice President **Dr. Joe Cindrich**, a former Pennsylvania All-State and All American guard joined former University of

Pittsburgh football teammates for the Pitt Panthers 50th Sugar Bowl Reunion on October 8th at Heinz Field in Pittsburgh. Joe played at Pitt in 1953-54 before joining the US Marines and later played for the Parris Island Marines before receiv-

ing a serious knee injury that halted a professional career in pro football.

Joe was honored by the invitation from his former teammates. The Sugar Bowl Team was introduced on the field before the game between Pitt and the University of Cincinnati. His wife Karen joined him and they both enjoyed the weekend of celebration.

A first generation Croatian-American, Joe has been very active with his leadership and support by helping young Croatians to pursue an education in Croatia while serving on the CSF Board of Directors

for over twelve years. He has also been a leader with the National Federation of Croatian Americans (NFCA) which he helped to establish in 1994 and later served as the president.

CSF greatly appreciates the many contributions Joe has made toward the success of its program over the years. Joe knows first-hand the importance of an education, having been both a teacher and football coach. He is dedicated to helping our Croatian students seek a better quality of life so they may become future leaders of the country.

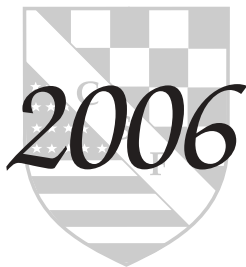


Ana Marija Flegar, Natural Science
